Dear Friends: November 2016

In 2015, Fundación Amistad nominated the Havana neighborhood of El Vedado to the World Monuments Fund's 2016/2017 Watch list of endangered places around the world. El Vedado was the first major urban neighborhood in Cuba to be built on a defined urban plan, and is recognized for its beauty and urban grace. It is a cultural, educational, commercial, and government center with a wealth of important destinations for Havana residents as well as numerous buildings of architectural significance. Sadly, much of the neighborhood's historic fabric continues to deteriorate at an alarming rate.

Vedado: An Ideas Symposium

The inclusion of the neighborhood of El Vedado on the WMF's Watch is a timely opportunity to tie the awareness, restoration, and revitalization of this vital part of La Habana to the growth of community, creativity, and economic development in Cuba. To generate discussion, FA organized a symposium conducted in October 2016 bringing together Cuban architects, planners, preservation specialists, educators, and authors with the leaders of the 50 largest US-based design firms represented by the American Institute of Architects' Large Firm Roundtable (AIA/LFRT). Materials for the symposium were prepared by one of the AIA/LFRT member firms, Ennead, based on research conducted by two recent RISD graduates whose fellowships in Havana were sponsored by FA.

A Vision for Revitalization and Sustainability

The 80 participants at the symposium shared ideas on the urban topics of culture, education, open space, sports, connectivity, transportation, entrepreneurship, hospitality, entertainment, urban anchors, and underutilized assets. Recent creative restorations – such as the Fabrica de Arte Cubano – were cited as excellent examples of cultural vibrancy from artistic entrepreneurs.

Vedado's diverse character gives the neighborhood a lively visual mix, and allows for growth and change while maintaining its unique legacy. The adaptability of its buildings to accommodate new uses – galleries, restaurants, government ministries, and museums – is a testament to its heritage and future. As Havana enters a new era of internal change and global connectivity, Vedado is the ideal urban platform where legacy and culture can meet innovation and incubation.

Next Steps

In 2017, a community Watch Day and exhibit will be scheduled to further heighten awareness of Vedado's potential. FA looks forward to participating with our Cuban colleagues and partners to shape a vision and approach to revitalization and restoration that is effective, sustainable, and achievable.
